Before the recent name change of the Bachelor of General Studies to the Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies, we surveyed students and alumni to learn what they saw as the strengths and weaknesses of the program. A frequent response was that they wished there were an option for a BA. The reason given was that the BA is a more recognizable degree among employers, compared to a Bachelor of General Studies (BGS) or a Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies (BIS). During the name change process, Curricular Affairs then brought to our attention that the University has a BA in Interdisciplinary Studies (at one time owned by the College of Letters, Arts & Sciences), but is currently inactive.

We propose changing the structure of the existing BA in Interdisciplinary Studies to make it like the BIS, adding the same degree requirements and concentration and emphasis areas. However, students in the BA program would be required to fulfill a 4<sup>th</sup>-semester language proficiency requirement (instead of 2nd-semester, as in the BIS).

Interdisciplinary Studies students who come into the university with (or who subsequently achieve) the requisite language proficiency will benefit from graduating with a more widely recognized degree. We also believe a BA will be of interest to potential students at Near You Network campuses and in Arizona Online Campus, helping the University increase the number of Arizonans graduating with a bachelors degree. Students who are already bilingual will easily be able to demonstrate 4th-semester proficiency. Increasing English/Spanish bilingual Hispanic students' access to the more recognizable degree will support the University's HSI mission. Having a BA in Interdisciplinary studies will also help us compete with peer and other institutions, many of whom offer a BA (and sometimes a BS as well) for their degree programs of this sort. For example, offering a BA in Interdisciplinary Studies will align us with ASU, which offers a BA in Interdisciplinary Studies with a large online presence.

According to data supplied by UAIR in June 2022, 1570, students have graduated with a Bachelor of General Studies (the precursor to the Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies) since 2017. Of those graduates,

335 (21%) had completed at least 4th-semester second language courses. Because UArizona provides students multiple ways to demonstrate language proficiency beyond just coursework (departmental credit by exam, Advanced Placement scores, IB scores, CLEP scores, etc.), the percentage of students who would be able to graduate with a BA, rather than a BIS, is likely even higher. We believe that making this option available for students who can meet the language requirement will be beneficial for job placement upon graduation.

VI. Faculty impact – will new faculty hires be required to deliver the new, proposed curriculum?

No new hires are needed. The students who would be able to take advantage of the opportunity to attain a BA instead of a BIS are already graduating having taken courses from across campus. Students typically fall into two groups: 1) transfer students who have already earned a large number of units that they want to apply towards a flexible degree, or 2) students who have encountered a barrier in their current major and are unable to complete the program or are unable to complete without extending their studies beyond their financial means. Students in either category typically come to the program late in their college careers and are able to complete within one to three semesters, so they have already earned a substantial number of units in other colleges (or from other institutions) before switching to Interdisciplinary Studies.

A recent analysis of data provided by UAIR shows that over the last five years, Bachelor of General Studies students graduated having taken courses from every academic college on Main Campus except for Veterinary Medicine. The biggest contributors have been the colleges previously affiliated as the Colleges of Letters, Arts and Science, which housed the program until CLAS was disestablished in 2019. Since that time, COH has been supporting the program.
