- IV. Describe the proposed changes to the program as well as the rationale for making the specific changes and include any relevant supporting data.

The BA Theatre Arts degree will evolve from a theatre-centric curriculum to one that encompasses making theatre (both scripted and devised), as well as screened and media performance. The new degree program better reflects the current industry perspective in which theatre training is a basis (rather than the sum total) of training for careers in theatre, film, television, and related media.

The existing major (49) and upper division (30) unit requirements present unnecessary obstruction to degree completion. The reduction to 40 major/20 upper division units is long overdue and aligns curricular complexity with similarly themed BA programs. Some examples/precedents: BA Games and Behavior, 36/18; BA Applied Humanities, Spatial Organization and Design Thinking, 42/24; BA Communications, 39/18; BA FTV 43/22 (also recently reduced); BA Human Rights Practices 36/21; BA Environmental Sciences 39/21. Students will still be able to take more than 40/20 in the major if they wish but will not be hindered by the unnecessary requirement of doing more, which will increase accessibility and program productivity.

professional work on and off the stage. Students earning a Bachelor of Arts in Theatre Arts receive a broadbased education of the theatrical arts. Students learn to appreciate the relationship of dramatic text to theatrical production; understand the working practices and standards of the professional theatre; communicate artistic intent through acting, directing, design and research; and learn how to organize resources to facilitate the theatrical production process. Coursework stresses critical thinking in verbal and written communication; employs theatre as a lens through which to examine cultural trends; encourages students to develop projects that merge theory and practical applications; and explores the vitality of theatre as a communal expression of gender and cultural diversity.

The proposed changes will not require any significant new resources. Faculty loads will be shifted from discontinued programs to this one. The current Harold Dixon Studio Theatre lab (Drama 116) will need to be equipped with a "2 camera + playback" system estimated at \$20k, allowing for greater utilization by existing programs, this program, and the planned transformed BFA Acting program. Additional sections of FTV 210 will require additional computer lab

classroom space and equipment as the program scales up.
