Scholars and professional organizations in the field of foreign languages increasingly have been promoting curricular reforms to include intermediate language courses to the requirement of German majors (Association of Departments of Foreign Languages Bulletin), rather than beginning to count the number of units for the major after students have completed their four semesters of basic language courses. Colleagues of German Studies at universities nationwide on the Women in German listsery, also have compared notes on how to restructure the German the major. 15 programs reviewed count the 4th semester, and 9 count the 3rd semester. Additionally, based on an overview of 22 programs, it has become clear that our major requires more units than most in terms of credit to degree (30 units, compared with 4 programs that had only 18, 3 had 21, 5 had 24, 7 had 27, and 3 had 30). Our plan to revise the major actually increases the number of total units required, to 32, but it would reduce the number of units required beyond the 202 level to 24, thus putting our program more in line with other programs around the country.
