The proposed changes strengthen the influence the social sciences in the major, expand the importance of the subplan classes in the major, and improve the way that students explore the relationships between globalization and local change. We changed the regional requirement by removing the regional emphasis from the major and stipulating that Global Studies majors declare and minor or second major in an area studies or language.

These changes arise from feedback from students and academic advisors. Students are drawn to the thematic emphases (subplans) more than the regional focus, but the current plan requires only 9 units within the subplan

and 12 units within the region. Furthermore, in the current major, beyond the unit requirement, specific requirements for the regional emphasis are not specified in the advisement report. As a result, the regional emphasis was created and subbed into the advisement report for each student individually in consultation with the academic advisor.


