Bachelor of Arts Degree, American Indian Studies Major, 19 students currently enrolled in the major. There is no emphasis for this major.

IV. Describe proposed changes to the major. Provide a rationale and explanation for making changes to the major and include any relevant supporting data. The goal for the proposed changes is to make the AIS major more accessible, less burdensome, and more attractive to students; all while maintaining its academic rigor and intellectual integrity. In the present model, students pursuing a Bachelor of Arts in AIS are required to take courses from four core concentrations (Literature, Law and Policy, Societies & Cultures, and Natural Resources). Students are also required to take courses from three separate AIS Cores, a broad list of electives, and one AIS writing emphasis course. In total, students majoring in AIS must complete 36 units; 18 of which at the Upper Division level. To simplify and streamline our major requirements, AIS is proposing the following: (1). Keep AIS Core I requirements the same (students will be required to take AIS 200 and AIS 220, both courses regularly offered during the academic year), (2). Eliminate the requirement for students to take AIS 493 – Internship (the only requirement in AIS Core II). This requirement has proven to be a serious roadblock for our students to complete their degrees, and the department no longer has office support or the necessary funds to run the internship program. While internships can be extremely valuable, many AIS students may not always have the time or money to devote to a (likely unpaid) internship. Many students may need to be working while in school to afford the cost of tuition and pay bills, and thus this requirement can reinforce existing inequities, (3). Eliminate the requirement for students to take AIS 448 – Research Methods. With the small number of AIS majors, it can be very difficult to offer and fill this course even just once per year. (4). Eliminate the requirement for students to take courses from each of the AIS Core Concentrations, and instead (4). Revise Core II requirements to only consist of 18 units from a comprehensive list of approved AIS department courses, (5). Eliminate the requirement for students to complete a designated AIS Writing Emphasis Course. Maintain the requirement for students to fulfill a Mid-Career Writing Assessment (MCWA) by either completing ENGL 102 with a “B” or better, or earn a “B” or better in an approved AIS writing emphasis course, (6). Allow students to fulfill the AIS Elective requirement (12 units) by taking either AIS department courses *or* courses that are cross-listed with AIS. Finally, making the above changes will not

only make the AIS major less burdensome and more flexible for students, the revisions will align AIS major requirements with our peer departments in the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences, namely the Arizona Center for Judaic Studies and the School of Sociology.

B.A. in Native American Studies, University of New Mexico (UNM) – The proposed changes to the AIS Major would be similar to UNM’s NAS Major in two ways: (1). Both degree programs will require students to take 18 credits of AIS/NAS core courses, (2) Both degree programs will not have an internship requirement. However, internship are options in both degrees. UNM’s degree major is different in that it requires students to complete 12 units from one of two specific concentrations (Leadership and Building Native Nations courses or Indigenous Learning Communities courses). The proposed AIS Major would not require students to choose a concentration.

B.A. in American Indian Studies, Arizona State University – The proposal is different than the AIS major at ASU in the following ways: The AIS Major at ASU requires students to complete 18 hours of courses from two major concentrations. The UA AIS degree does not have any concentrations. The AIS major at UA gives students more flexibility and allows students to take 18 units from a comprehensive list of AIS department courses. The proposal is similar to ASU in that both majors will offer greater flexibility than the current UA AIS degree with regard to course choices. In addition, both ASU and the UA proposal will not require an internship or research methods components.
